The Americans for Nonsmokers' Rights Foundation compiled a list of the smoking policies of the 35 busiest airports in the country, ranking each airport by total passenger traffic.

Hartsfield-Jackson Airport **ranked first** in passenger traffic but **ranks near the bottom for its commitment to protect employees and passengers from exposure to secondhand smoke.**

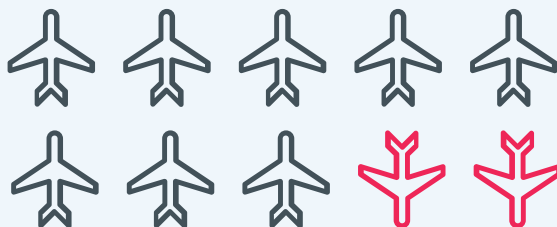

of the busiest airports in the United States are **completely smoke-free** indoors.

A 2012 Centers for Disease Control report found that the air pollution inside airport smoking areas was **23 times higher than levels in smokefree airports.**

The study also found that the **air pollution levels from secondhand smoke outside the smoking areas were 5 times higher** than levels in smokefree airports.
